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# Valley Quality of Life Survey 2025: A Focus on Social Connectedness and Age-Friendliness

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#### **Project Overview**

The Lehigh Valley Quality of Life Study was conducted in May 2025 by the Muhlenberg College Institute of Public Opinion (MCIPO) in partnership with United Way of the Greater Lehigh Valley (UWGLV) and WFMZ Channel 69. The telephone-based survey was administered to a random sample of 544 residents living in Lehigh and Northampton counties and was weighted according to known Census population demographic parameters to make the sample more representative. A diverse sample of residents shared their perceptions about quality of life in the region, including views about change, key economic and social features of their communities and their own personal well-being.

Among the goals of the 2025 Quality of Live Survey was special interest in understanding more about social connectedness in the Lehigh Valley. In 2023, the U.S. Surgeon General identified loneliness as an urgent public health concern, linked to both individual and societal health. For example, loneliness is linked to greater risk for dementia, disease, depression and anxiety. It may also be an indirect measure and potential consequence of social connections in schools, workplaces and civic organizations in our communities. Identifying the degree to which Lehigh Valley residents experience loneliness, or conversely convey strong social connections, is a step in meeting the Surgeon General's challenge to strengthen individual and community health through meaningful relationships that make us healthier and happier. It is also a step in advancing the work of United Way of the Greater Lehigh Valley (UWGLV), which for more than a decade, has supported research to better understand the needs of seniors in our region and to inform actions that support age-friendly communities.

This report summarizes the findings of the Quality-of-Life Survey with a special focus on how seniors perceive quality of life in the region and key aspects of their own lives. The attitudes and experiences of seniors are a critical dimension of quality of life for all residents. The way our community is built determines how easily seniors can access services, feel safe, stay healthy and stay connected. According to the AARP, healthy aging and age-friendly communities are supported by eight "domains of livability": outdoor space, transportation, housing, social participation, social inclusion, civic participation, communication and information and community and health services. These domains also inform the Pennsylvania Department of Aging's strategic planning and development of a ten-year Master Plan for Older Adults. The survey findings reported here are helpful in thinking about translating these national and statewide initiatives to our own community and in identifying the key challenges, opportunities and priorities for seniors in the Lehigh Valley.

Due to sample size, the margin of error for subgroups within the sample is higher. Percentages may not add up to 100 due to rounding. Unless otherwise noted, all data are weighted by sex, race, age, and education according to the 2020 U.S. Census profile for Lehigh and Northampton counties.

According to the U.S. Census Bureau's American Community Survey (ACS), in 2023, approximately 19% of the 691,335 people living in the Lehigh Valley were seniors, ages 65 and older. This equals about 65,126 seniors in Lehigh County and 62,869 seniors in Northampton County. The population of seniors in the region is diverse. Previous research shows seniors' experiences vary across the Lehigh Valley in several key ways:

- County differences. Conditions can look very different in Lehigh versus Northampton.
- Socioeconomic factors. Income, education and employment all affect access to resources.
- Geography. Life in rural areas can differ markedly from life in urban centers.
- Cultural and family context. Traditions, family structures and support networks shape daily life.
- **Individual circumstances.** Personal health status and other unique factors influence each senior's experience.

These earlier research studies provide an important backdrop to the current survey, reminding us that even in contexts in which large majorities provide positive evaluations of life in the Valley, there are key subgroups of our population who have quite different experiences, in some cases due to marginalization and significant unmet need.

In contrast to previous UWGLV studies focusing on seniors only, the 2025 Quality of Life Survey is focused on how age is related to community satisfaction and experiences of social connection among people of all ages in the Lehigh Valley. This represents a shift in focus away from individual-level characteristics of seniors toward community-level variables related to age-friendliness. The extent to which the Lehigh Valley is age-friendly can be expected to shape the evaluations of all residents in the region across different stages of life. Age-friendly communities are inclusive and supportive and foster the health and well-being of individuals of all ages. The 2025 Quality of Life Survey offers a fresh look at the strengths and challenges of our region, providing a broader understanding about the ways residents of different ages experience life in the region.

### **Key Findings**

- There is much to be proud about in the Lehigh Valley. Significant majorities of survey respondents across all age groups rate the quality of life in our region as either "excellent" or "good."
- Seniors, ages 65 and older, report very positive perceptions, both when it comes to evaluating key features of the region—such as parks/outdoor spaces, the economy, and social connections in neighborhoods—and when it comes to reflecting on their own individual well-being through measures of social isolation and loneliness. Positive evaluations are even stronger among older residents, ages 75 and older. For example, 75% of respondents ages 75 and older rate the economy in the Lehigh Valley as excellent; 97% of them say they are satisfied with their relationships with neighbors; 74% say they never, or hardly ever, feel lonely or isolated from others. The perceptions of older adults in our region are in many ways an optimistic correction to societal expectations about aging.

- Although seniors are optimistic about quality of life in the region, they are less positive about the direction of change in the Lehigh Valley. This is especially the case among seniors who have lived in the region their entire lives, close to one-half of whom believe that life in the region is "getting worse." By comparison, only 8% of seniors who moved to the region in the past ten years say life is "getting worse." Put differently, relative newcomers are more positive about their future in the Lehigh Valley—a good sign that the region is a welcoming place filled with potential opportunity—while life-long residents are more positive about their past and somewhat less positive about the future—a reflection, perhaps, of the strength of attachment to community and the mixed-bag consequences of rapid change and growth in the region.
- When seniors are asked to explain why they perceive life in the region to be getting better, they mention features such as location; nature and outdoor spaces; arts, and community. When asked why they perceive life in the region to be getting worse, they mention issues such as housing, transportation, overdevelopment, traffic and crime. Survey respondents across all age categories note similar levels of concern with key issues, with majorities saying they are somewhat or very concerned by the loss of open spaces, the affordability of housing and the affordability of health care.
- In many categories of quality of life studied in the survey, older adults report more positive perceptions than younger and middle-age groups, confirming previous research which finds mental health and well-being tend to decline in middle-age. The perceptions, challenges and opportunities of middle adulthood in the Lehigh Valley remain relatively unexplored; therefore, these findings point to questions ripe for future research.
- Survey findings suggest that the Lehigh Valley has a high degree of social connectedness
  experienced by individuals of all ages, and that these connections are important to individuals'
  emotional wellbeing. Respondents communicate strong feelings of satisfaction with their
  relationships with neighbors, recreation and entertainment options, neighborhood safety,
  intergenerational interactions and travel in and around the Lehigh Valley.
- Of special interest, the youngest adults in the survey, ages 18 to 24, communicate the most negative perceptions of social connections and, perhaps as a partial consequence, they also communicate more negative assessments about their own experiences of social isolation and loneliness. These findings confirm developing national studies which suggest young people report troubling high rates of loneliness likely driven by a variety of factors and, in the absence of intervention, with potential long-term negative consequences for healthy aging.
- Taken as a whole, the 2025 Quality of Life survey findings suggest that age-friendliness in the Lehigh Valley is a multi-faceted process through which individuals interact with the environment. Our experiences of aging reflect the intersection of key features of the region— the economy, housing, transportation, crime, loss of open space—with social networks in our neighborhoods, and with individual level attitudes, experiences and personal sense of well-being.

### **Analysis and Discussion**

### Overall Satisfaction with Quality of Life in the Lehigh Valley

Lehigh Valley surveys consistently show that majorities of residents rate the Valley as either an excellent or good place to live. This is the case across all age categories, and it has remained generally consistent overtime (Figure 1). Evaluations of the region do vary, however, in important ways by education, income and race/ethnicity (Appendix III).

Of special interest, age generally has a U-shaped relationship with quality-of-life ratings, such that both younger and older respondents report the most positive evaluations. Approximately 94% of respondents ages 75 and older rate the Valley as an "excellent" or "good" place to live (Figure 2). In comparison, although respondents ages 55 to 64 are still overwhelmingly positive—with 80% saying the region is an "excellent" or "good" place to live—this age group is more negative than the others, perhaps reflecting what is sometimes called a "mid-life dip" or "mid-life curve" in overall happiness and satisfaction. <sup>6</sup>







Figure 4. Respondents' Views on Life in Valley Getting Better or Getting Worse, by Age

Although the vast majority of residents in the Lehigh Valley share positive views on quality of life, things get more complicated when respondents are asked if life in the region is moving a positive or negative direction. Thirty-eight percent of all survey respondents say that life in the region is "getting better," compared to 32% who say that it is "getting worse" and 21% who say it is "staying the same" (Figure 3). Age matters to these evaluations in significant ways as shown in Figure 4. Among the younger age groups, ranging from 18 to 54, more than 40% of respondents say that life is getting better; this figure drops to between 26% and 29% among older age categories. In fact, 41% of respondents ages 65 to 74 say life in the region is getting worse.

Figure 3. In general, would you say that life in the Lehigh Valley is getting better or getting worse?

Seniors' perceptions of positive or negative change are clearly linked to the length of time they have lived in the region. As seen in Figure 5, close to one-half of seniors who have lived in the Lehigh Valley their entire lives say that things are getting worse. Among seniors who moved to the Valley in the past 10 years, however, only 8% say things are getting worse. First-hand experiences are clearly driving evaluations of the direction of change. These findings invite additional consideration about the differences between forward-looking and backward-looking quality of life perspectives.<sup>7</sup>

The survey invited respondents to explain, in their own words, why they believe life in the Lehigh Valley is getting better or getting worse. Figure 6 illustrates the most common responses to this question among seniors, ages 65 and older, providing a visual illustration of the issues most on seniors' minds. What some respondents see as a reason things are getting better—increased population, for example—another respondent may see as a reason things are getting worse. What is most useful about Figure 6 is that it highlights the types of change Lehigh Valley seniors are experiencing. Across the survey as a whole (as seen in Appendix II), housing, a variety of social opportunities (arts, restaurants, shopping, etc.) and job opportunities were most frequently mentioned as the reasons that life is "getting better." Population (size and change), traffic, crime and economic issues were the most frequently mentioned reasons by those who believe life in the Lehigh Valley is "getting worse."

### **Community Aspects Supporting Quality of Life**

The survey sought to understand how respondents evaluate key features of the Lehigh Valley. In the context of age-friendly communities these variables help draw attention to the ways that aging is process in which individuals interact with the social, cultural and economic environment in dynamic ways. These variables also prompt consideration about the ways that attitudes toward aging and generational attitudinal differences influence perceptions of community.

As shown in Table 1, Lehigh Valley seniors' evaluations of key aspects of the region—the economy, housing, race relations, transportation, public schools, parks and outdoor spaces and retail stores—follow the same pattern as respondents from all age groups. In general, majorities of Lehigh Valley residents rate each of these aspects as either "excellent" or "good," although in the case of housing, transportation and public schools the majorities are small or essentially split.

There are a few differences across age categories that are worth noting in Table 1. Most respondents who say that the economy and housing in the Lehigh Valley are excellent or good is found among respondents ages 75 and older. These differences are not necessarily statistically significant, but they may be substantively significant—perhaps reflecting older residents' relative economic stability and/or housing compared to younger age groups. For example, younger adults, who are far less positive about the economy and housing, may be seeking to buy a home, or to find employment; middle-age adults may be seeking to move within the region (as shown in Appendix III, no respondents ages 55 to 64 rated housing in the Valley as "excellent," with a majority settling instead on "good" in their evaluation). A smaller percentage of seniors ages 65 to 74 evaluate the economy and housing in positive terms, perhaps reflecting economic uncertainty and concern linked to retirement. Older residents are less positive when it comes to evaluating retail stores and, among those 75 and older, they are also less positive about race relations.<sup>8</sup>

It is also interesting to consider the proportions of seniors who said they are "unsure" when it comes to evaluating race relations, transportation, public schools and parks and outdoor spaces. In the case of public schools, it is perhaps not surprising that more older adults are unsure, given the ways that one's interactions with schools is most often a function of sharing families with and/or parenting young children, which may become less likely with age. In other areas, however, that older adults are more likely to say "unsure" could signal potential obstacles to the region's age-friendliness. For example, are older respondents "unsure" about parks and outdoor spaces because they spend less time in these spaces and is this a reflection of access? Or, is access to parks and outdoor spaces less important to quality-of-life measures among seniors than among younger age groups? Are older adults less sure and more negative about race relations because they are more likely to live in segregated places within the Valley?

These findings point to possible areas worthy of future research. The key takeaway from Table 1 is that survey respondents are relatively positive, although perhaps not overwhelmingly so, when it comes to evaluating aspects of the region. Age shapes respondents' evaluations in interesting ways, with middle-aged adults in general less positive than younger or older groups. It is also important to keep in mind, as seen in Appendix III, that perceptions of these community features vary in significant ways by income, race/ethnicity, and education.

Individuals help create their own well-being by using the resources that are available to them in their communities and neighborhoods. Features of neighborhoods, therefore, can have both positive or negative consequences for how individuals perceive quality of life at both the community and personal level. The features of neighborhoods that matter the most to individual quality of life may vary with age. Table 2 summarizes respondents' level of concern for key features of neighborhoods across different age categories. As shown, residents of all ages generally share the same concerns, with majorities saying they are "very concerned" or "somewhat concerned" with the loss of open spaces, the affordability of housing, and the affordability of health care at the top of the list. Looking closer at these key aspects of communities by age, higher percentages of middle-age adults communicate concern about loss of open space, becoming a victim of a crime, housing costs and health care costs when compared to the youngest and oldest age categories.

Across all survey respondents, however, white respondents were more positive about race relations compared to Black/African American and Hispanic/Latino.

### Social Connections, Relationships and Emotional Well-Being





Figure 7. Respondents Who are "Very Satisfied" or "Somewhat Satisfied" with Community Social Connections, by Age

A key theme of the 2025 Quality of Life Survey is social connectedness. The survey included questions designed to measure residents' levels of satisfaction with a variety of social interactions. As shown in Figure 7, respondents across all age categories report high levels of satisfaction across each variable. Of particular interest, in each category, the oldest respondents (ages 75+) have more positive evaluations than the youngest respondents (ages 18-24). It is the youngest respondents, ages 18 to 24, who are least positive about community social connections; smaller proportions of young adults are satisfied with their relationships with neighbors, recreation and entertainment options, neighborhood safety and opportunities to interact with others across generations. Respondents are slightly less positive in their evaluation of their ability to travel around the Valley compared to other measures, but even here close to three-quarters say they are "very" or "somewhat satisfied."

Most respondents share positive perceptions about community social connections— these are important variables that may be linked to individuals' experiences of social isolation and loneliness. Findings from earlier UWGLV research, in 2019 and again in 2021, suggest that seniors who live alone, who are low-income and who have disabilities (such as those related to activities of daily living and instrumental activities of daily living) are more likely to report feelings of loneliness and social isolation. The questions on the 2025 Quality of Life Survey provide an opportunity to think about the ways that features of the community interact with age and other individual level characteristics to shape experiences of social isolation and loneliness.




Figure 9. How would you describe your own mental health or emotional well-being at this time? By Age

The survey asked respondents several questions about social isolation and emotional well-being (Figures 8-9). Similar to findings above which suggest that younger respondents are less positive about social connections than older respondents, feelings of loneliness and isolation are more prevalent among

younger respondents and generally improve with age. The same is true of respondents' descriptions of their mental health and emotional well-being, with higher proportions of younger adults describing their mental health as fair or poor compared to older age groups. Between 6% and 8% of respondents between the ages of 25 and 64 say that they feel lonely or isolated "all of the time." The pattern is generally the same in Figure 9, with age contributing to more positive assessments of mental health and emotional wellbeing. Whereas 23% of respondents ages 18-24 describe their mental health and emotional well-being as "fair" or "poor" only 9% of those ages 65 to 74 and 4% of those 75 and older say the same.

Figure 8. How often, if ever, do you feel lonely or isolated from those around you? By Age

Recognizing that older adults are at risk of social isolation and loneliness, especially due to potential erosion of social networks and the increased prevalence of chronic health conditions with age, these findings are reassuring: most seniors in the Lehigh Valley say that they are rarely lonely and provide positive evaluations of social connections. These findings also confirm previous research which shows that individual optimism and positive evaluations of life often increase with age, despite the challenges of aging (such as, for example, death of a spouse or loss of independence).<sup>10</sup>


At the same time, these findings point to many factors that may contribute to social isolation and loneliness among younger age groups. In addition to the environmental variables included in the Quality of Life Survey, worthy topics of future research include additional determinants of mental health and well-being, such as work stress, job instability, parenting and child care, elder care, social supports, economic security, access to services and social justice.

Age-friendly communities are attentive to the features of our environment which benefit all ages. For example, both younger and older adults in our region certainly benefit from relationships with neighbors and are more likely to experience isolation and loneliness in the absence of those relationships. This is clearly shown in Figure 10, which shows that for all survey respondents, those who are most satisfied with their relationships with neighbors are also more likely to say that they "never" or "hardly ever" feel lonely or isolated.
